## Enriching Your Visit: The Public Art Program

The Washington State Convention & Trade Center's public art program, perhaps the largest of its kind in the nation, was established to provide an environment that enriches the experience of all who visit the facility.

The creative incorporation of art into the original design of the Convention Center was accomplished via the state's Percent for the Arts Program. Since then, due to the board of directors' commitment to provide civic benefits to the state of Washington, the four-story Galleria has offered an ever-changing collection of two- and three-dimensional artworks readily accessible to meeting attendees and the public.

In 1997, the board established the Washington State Convention & Trade Center Art Foundation at the recommendation of original board member Phyllis Lamphere. The foundation is a nonprofit corporation and serves the Center's public art program as a means to raise money for commissioned works.

The program has two components: permanent works and rotating exhibitions.

The permanent collection consists of gifts, long-term loans and commitments from museums, corporations, art organizations, private collectors and professional artists who continually display works from their respective collections.

Rotating exhibits are booked approximately two years in advance following a screening process by an art advisory committee. Over 120 exhibitions and displays have been featured in the Galleria since 1991. Many of these exhibits feature local artists, although a number of them are national or international juried exhibitions created specifically for the Center.

The Galleria is a public space that has established a reputation for being an excellent exhibit site with tremendous daily visibility. Each year, over 500,000 visitors have the opportunity to view this collection with no admission charge.

The Center strives to provide a link to museums and art institutions, with an emphasis on encouraging visits to other public art locations throughout the area.

Lectures, concerts and artist receptions are offered free to the public to provide entertainment and/or a deeper understanding of the art forms. In many instances lectures are scheduled in conjunction with the exhibitions, either to explain more about the works on display or to demonstrate the art form.

## Taking the Tour

The Washington State Convention & Trade Center features approximately 100 works of art on public display around four levels of its North and South Galleries. Several other works are located in its office and convention lobby areas. Areas of the facility that may not be available to the public due to convention-related activities are clearly noted.

This self-guided, self-paced tour booklet was designed to direct you to the many different areas where artworks are currently on display. A few of the works listed in this booklet are located outside of the Center.

This self-tour begins on Level 1 just south of the Convention Place entrance. The indicated route will direct you back to the south escalators for easy access to the next level. All areas of this tour are also accessible by elevator.

We hope you enjoy your visit to the Convention Center.

## Rotating Exhibitions

An ever-changing collection of art is displayed on Level 2 of the Galleria. These temporary exhibitions may also include display cases located on Level 3 of the South Galleria.

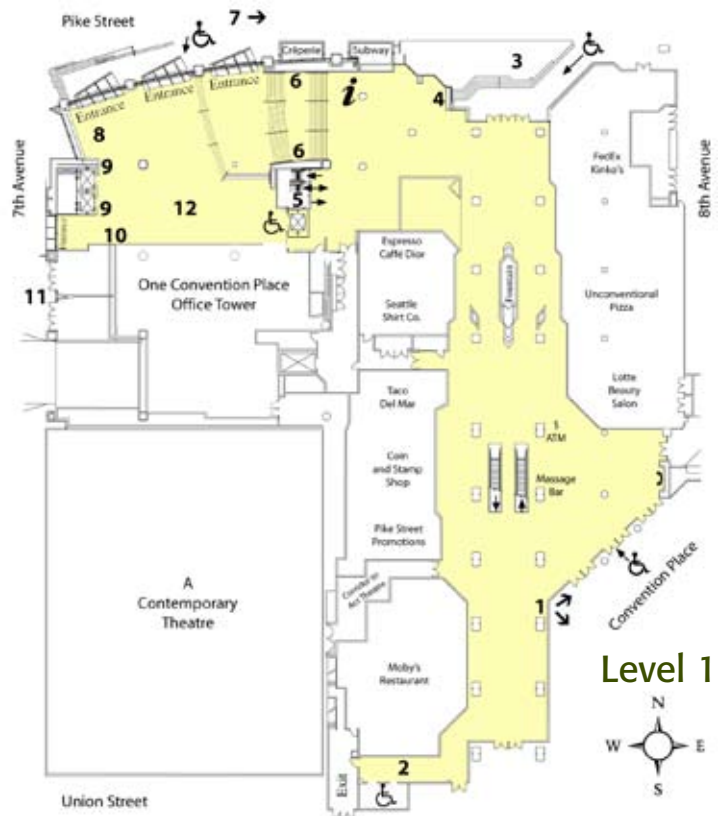
## 8 **Lebeg** (*slight movement in the air*)

This suspended sculpture can be viewed from all four levels of the North Galleria atrium. *Lebeg* is composed of nine multi-faceted, elliptical pendants covered with thousands of hand-cut, translucent glass pieces. The title of the sculpture comes from the Hungarian word meaning "slight movement in the air." The name is appropriate as the sculpture is turned very slowly by a small motor. Funding for *Lebeg* was provided by the Art in Public Places Program.

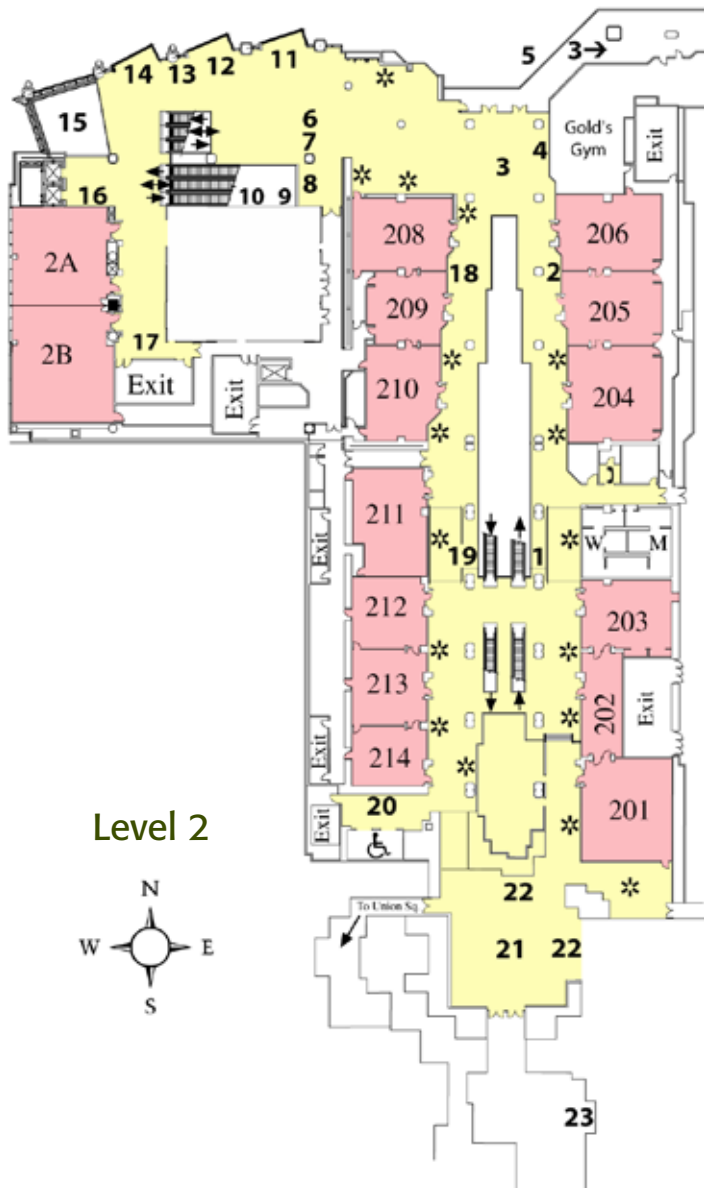

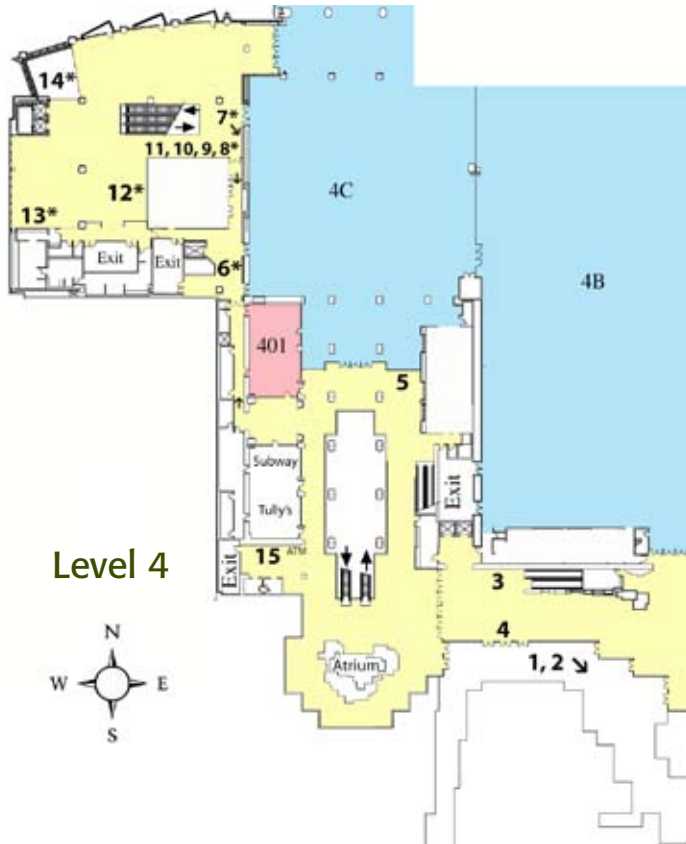
## Level 6 - East Lobby and West Lobby
